Dark Intrigue in Canberra

Canberra lobbyist and Man for All Seasons, Ted White, with our very own Paul Crompton

July guest speaker, Ted White, became a chartered accountant by accident, having been offered a position with the leading firm of Edwin Nixon in Melbourne- the principal of which he regularly caddied for - finally led to the establishment of his own practice in 1971. His ambition was to gain specialised competencies over a range of industries and professions. To develop these, he had undertaken a wide variety of employment in fields as diverse as manual labour in Western Australia, time with Sun Valley Foods, plus a stint with Australian Carbon Black, to name but a few. His activities subsequently involved many other ventures including market gardens, electronic gaming machines, even some factory construction. Throughout his career, he was involved with the Australian Chemical Industry Council, the peak manufacturers' association, where he was active as a lobbyist. Early on, however, he detected the problem of the very bad press the industry was receiving as an important tariff hearing was proceeding. He traced this to undue influence being exerted on many junior members of the Press Club resulting in a steady stream of slanted reporting. A chance meeting in Canberra led him to learn that a very senior newspaper figure was actively involved and, indeed, had gained access to a yet-to-be-released confidential industry report. Somewhat mysteriously, a copy of this report was 'discovered' in Ted's motor vehicle, but subsequently followed by allegations of his stealing classified information. Obviously, he had been followed during his activities seeking to prove that confidential information was being passed to overseas companies. Many of us were left to wonder how one man could achieve so much. Alan Trumble

Alan regularly assists us by writing reports when Recorder, Alan Williams, is away. See above. Many will remember him speaking to us a few years ago about his 50 years in the textile industry or 'rag trade'. During his time, he saw dramatic changes taking place in manufacturing industry in

Australia and was rarely far from the action.

After his early apprenticeship as a junior selling fabric to retailers, principally up and down the industry's traditional home, Flinders Lane, he was promoted and had experience with a number of companies, some well-known, others not; mainly in women's wear: hosiery, knitwear, underwear, skirts, and sleepwear. He knew them all inside and out, eventually moving to sales with an agent and importer of textile machinery and raw materials, in a company owned by wife Jann's father, for nine years. He was involved in the importation of raw cotton from India and the United States and machinery from Germany, Switzerland, Italy and the UK. "It was," he says," a very exciting time." The morning mail each day brought new products and developments; everything from new machines for carpet manufacturing to technological breakthroughs in hosiery (for example, seamless compared with the traditional full-fashion stockings, the ones with the seam running up the back, as in days of

yore) - machines that could knit stockings in 15 minutes, then eight minutes and later four minutes, and finally in two. Recruited by one of his clients - Kayser - he moved to head their lingerie division in Melbourne but was beginning to feel he might have had enough of work as an employee. He decided to start his own small sleepwear company - Pedita Pty Ltd - as a volume supplier in Northcote, soon winning the account to supply an emerging retailer, Target. The business expanded rapidly employing some 400 people and acquiring his major competitor, Diamond Cut. Apart from being CEO, he was also President of the Textile Council, taking on Canberra over tariffs, a losing battle. "I began to see the writing on the wall, as it were," Alan says. "It was inevitable." Gradually he moved his manufacturing operation to China - which brought its own problems - and he merged his company with a Hong Kong/China-controlled company where they provided the premises and he the know-how. "It wasn't easy. Influence is often the way they do things there but it is necessary to understand both the temperament of the people and respect their country." The people Alan felt sorry for most were the Australian bluecollar workers who lost their jobs; 50-year old Italians and Greeks who had pride in their work and, all of a sudden, lost their jobs. He feels the major changes that were made in Australian manufacturing were made too rapidly. "It was very sad," he says. He retired in 2002.

Nowadays, his interest is centred on his holiday shack at Mt Martha which he and Jann retreat to as often as possible. "A bit of the Dandenongs beside the beach," he calls it. He has been active in Rotary for 10 years and likes to play Bridge - once a week usually, but because his wife says he won't improve at that rate, he now plays twice a week.

Legal Loopholes



Our 10-minute speaker for July, John Bushby, gave an entertaining address, largely on the lighter side of the law

John Bushby is a criminal lawyer with many stories to tell about the law and the ways that defence lawyers achieve justice for their clients. John's view is that loopholes don't often 'drop out of the sky' - 'the more research we do, the more solutions we find," he says. He told one story of a man who was arrested for having a fake ASIO pass. But when he came to guiz ASIO people about their authentic passes, their answer was "can't say" or "can't tell you." Needless to say, because it proved impossible to either gather the required information or obtain a genuine ASIO pass, the client was freed for lack of evidence. John said that the Australian Federal Police 'haven't exactly covered themselves with glory' and he cited their handling of the case that allowed a group of young Australian drug-takers, loaded with heroine, to travel to a jurisdiction (Indonesia) where they knew they would be incarcerated under threat of the death penalty. He also told the amusing story of one defendant who was arrested and charged with sneezing on a police officer. However, the judge dismissed the charge when the officer in the witness box was not able to sneeze at will because "it just isn't possible to sneeze deliberately!" He referred to loopholes explored by Tony Mokbel who evaded justice by leaving the country and referred to the problems of obtaining forensic evidence on drug-taking. He saved, perhaps the best, until last relating the case under Justice Starke in which the defendant asked to be released because of the fact, as he explained, his wife was about to conceive; the judge released him.

...Lake Eyre Miracle <u>from p1</u> Only about 50% of the lake is covered but we gained a good view of the southern part which has a lot of water – and the Warburton Gutter through which the water flows across Lake Eyre. Our flight continued up Warburton Creek to Cowarie Station, where unfortunately, we did not see much bird life - apparently the birds are further north where there is plenty of food....... We flew across to Cooper Creek and followed it towards Lake Eyre and Maree. Cooper Creek has by now reached Lake Eyre and so more of the lake will be covered in water. We then flew over the punt which ferries vehicles across the creek and down over the area where the unique Lake Eyre Yacht club was holding its regatta for the first time in many years. Then back to Maree for lunch.....
