It was indeed a privilege to hear from someone as intelligent as Michael who has personally been involved in Iraq.

Lunch at the RSL is an important matter. Your Committee met with the caterers after lunch at the last Meeting and had a frank discussion with them. There were a few problems revealed and I believe our deliberations went a long way towards resolving them. The Committee was of the opinion that the quality and quantity of food served was very good but we discussed ways to speed up the serving time in future. Working for Dialogue and Reconciliation

The task of the team was to get dialogue and reconciliation between Council Members from the various districts, most of whom had not spoken or co-operated with each other for over two years.

It was a privilege to have Michael Thurston, US Consul General to Melbourne, give the Keynote Address at our July meeting on the theme 'Perspectives from the Front'.

Michael spoke firstly on some of the key issues facing President Obama during his first six months as President; for example, Iraq, Afghanistan, the Middle East, China, North Korea, and the need to renew dialogue with Russia, and the current economic position in the US.

He also spoke of the importance of the U.S/Australian friendship to the Obama administration, mentioning the large number of phone discussions and meetings already shared between President Obama and Prime Minister Rudd, particularly at the G20 meeting on our support in Afghanistan. At the very time Michael was speaking of the partnership, Operation Talisman Saber was under way in Queensland and the Northern Territory, in further demonstration of the strength of the US and Australian alliance and our defence co-operation.

and current context of engagement in Iraq, the history and role of the Provisional Reconstruction Teams(of which he was the team leader), the synergies between the military and diplomatic activities, and signs of progress in Iraq.

Michael and his team in Iraq worked as civilians and said he found that, because of this informal approach - and not being military personnel - it was easier to be accepted by local communities. He also mentioned their resilience and the determination of the local people to be active in the rebuilding of their communities

Michael spoke to a series of slides that gave us a visual sense of the Diyala province where reconstruction was working. His team had modified the techniques started in Vietnam, in which the major problems involve trying to tie local governments to central governments. During the Saddam Hussein regime, the districts were not allowed to work autonomously; it was: conform to the regime or be shot. As a result of Saddam's overthrow, there was little or no co-operation within the various districts and clans. more often because of the distrust between the Shiites and Sunnis. The task of the team was to start dialogue and reconciliation between Council Members from the various districts, most of whom had neither spoken nor co -operated with each other for over two years. The task was to encourage community groups to commence work from the grass roots in order to improve co-operation with the Central Government and thereby to begin to rebuild infrastructure, education and medical services throughout the country.

Consul General Michael gave us ample evidence that the process of rebuilding civil society in Iraq was headed in a very positive direction.

Just to prove he has been almost everywhere, here is Rod standing on the balcony overlooking New Zealand's famous Milford Sound

Rod was with the Shell Company of Australia for 45 years - starting in 1949,

as many young people did, in the humble mailing room. After completing his accountancy studies, he found himself working in Accounting, Personnel, and later Industrial Relations and Superannuation, including a stint as Depot Auditor for Queensland. "The mere fact that I had such a multiplicity of careers within Shell was perhaps my major achievement," he says, starting in Brisbane, moving to Melbourne, to Sydney and back to Melbourne. One major experience he recalls was his time in National Service at RAAF Amberley, his first opportunity to 'break away from the apron strings of home.' But he must have been some kind of surfer during all those years because he says he still gets withdrawal symptoms if he can't get back to Queensland each year; particularly around Burleigh Heads. He and Ros know the Newell Highway like the back of their hand as they have traversed it four times a year for yonks to spend time on the beach. ("The water's

too cold down here," he confesses.) His other great love is cycling. "I've always had a bike - I love to get on a bike and blow away the cobwebs"; though in his youth it was motorbikes. Despite the fact that Ros's father wasn't too impressed to see his daughter astride Rod's machine. Nowadays, it's walking. He says he and Ros usually walk between 5 and 10 km four to five times a week.

But the Murrells are also inveterate travellers, off globe-trotting to faraway places at the drop of a hat. There are mounted photos around the walls of Rod's study evoking memories of places they've been to in 55 countries, including China, Vietnam, India, Pacific islands, NZ, UK, Cambodia, Europe, North and South America, and many countries in Africa and the Middle East. Then there's golf. He says he is very envious of those who play golf in the area on the sand-belt courses while he has to negotiate the traffic on his way to Mount Waverley; but there's a simple explanation. "When you join a club and make friendships, it's very hard to leave," he says. Probus is pretty much the same. "Leaving Vermont, I joined Probus to meet people in this area. It has been one of the great experiences of my life, having made so many friends. I value it highly." Rod was President of the Club in 2005.

At our July meeting, we were entertained by a screen show presented by Secretary. John Howe. He showed us his approach to the subject of energy saving in his own home by using the government rebate to have Solar Panels installed and connected to the grid. He has recorded the resulting

savings over the period since installation which showed an impressive power cost reduction with an anticipated amortisation of his outlay over only a few years. He is now working on a solar hot water panel installation to provide further savings.

The video illustrations were recorded on a portable USB drive stick using MS Excell software, which makes such presentations by any of our Members relatively simple to provide. We invite Members wishing to use this method to present their pet projects or written material of interest (up to 20 minutes) at future Meetings.

We continue to review our Model Portfolio each month and at the July market close, we were showing a 36% gain. We would encourage all Members to come along and participate in forthcoming meetings.


