MONTHLY PROFILE Barry Amond

Barry at the helm of his sounds and sights system

The first thing to know about Barry is that he loves Probus. "It's been marvellous," he says about his time in the Club since 1996. He was Treasurer for two years and then President, and was the first Chairman of the Investment Group. He and wife,

Margaret, have been on most of the overseas trips, many of the day trips and theatre visits and, of course, are a mainstay of the Music and Opera Groups.

Barry first came to Australia in the 60s as an actuary, of which there were only about 100 in the whole country at the time. "Being an actuary is working with the probability of events occurring in the future," he says - which led him into working with, first, insurance companies and then, later, superannuation schemes for government agencies in Australia, as well as corporations such as Myer. But it is his other interests, perhaps, that define the man. While he describes himself as 'non-musical', he has a passion for opera and music which began in his school years when his class visited London to see a rugby match, afterwards going to see a Mozart opera at Sadler Wells. That was it; a flame was lit that continues today - despite the fact that he plays no musical instrument and cannot sing. By way of emphasis, he adds, "I'm no music buff and Margaret hates me trying to sing."

However, Barry spends a lot of his time looking for new music experiences for the Club's Music and Opera Groups which he hosts for Members and wives . One of

his main sources is the Ovation Channel on Foxtel. The groups meet in Margaret's studio at home every month or so to watch and listen to selected musical highlights - he has had as many as 48 people at one time - much of which Barry has recorded on his hard disk. A projector, an overhead screen and strategically-placed speakers are all part of the (some would say 'unique') experience.

Also, as one of those do-it-yourself kind of people who have the confidence to tackle any task around the home, Barry has always liked solving practical problems himself without feeling the need to call in an outside expert. "It's not just the money saved," he says. "It's the feeling of knowing I can do it myself, inside or out in the garden." To the point where his children used to call him 'Mr Fixit'. He just loves making things - from furniture to dolls' houses to a puppet theatre for Margaret to use for workshops at Beaumaris Art Group (where he is Treasurer). The other thing he loves is sport - from pennant tennis in his youth, hockey and rugby, to golf (at VGC) these days. He even supports the Demons!

But there's more. His eyes light up as he tells the story of his pioneering days with computers in the 60s when he was with a major UK life office. Using a huge computer that occupied an entire room, he once wrote a program that took all night to run but in the end came up with a complete spreadsheet of premium rates. "It was like magic," he says gleefully. "From that time on, instead of actuarial students doing hundreds of time-consuming manual calculations, computers could do them." It's the sort of thing that gets Barry excited.

January's guest speaker,

Paul Crompton, was an Ansett executive at the time of the infamous pilots' strike in 1989, a six-month period which had an enormous effect on both the community and the company. His presentation was of particular interest to Members, as many would have used the services of Ansett during the years 1931-2002 and included slides of vehicles and aircraft in that period.

Reginald Myles Ansett began a taxi service in Hamilton, expanding to other country centres in Victoria and SA. He had to overcome obstacles placed in his path - including Government regulations on carrying paying passengers in competition to the Victorian Railways - so he gave his passengers a free ride and charged them for the oranges supplied on the trip! In 1933, he learnt to fly a Tiger Moth and graduated in 1936 to an 8-passenger aircraft, flying out of Essendon Airport in 1937. During World War II, the company expanded dramatically, building component

manufacturing facilities and workshops converting buses for his growing fleet of Pioneer coaches. By the end of the war, Ansett employed 2000, flew DC3 aircraft, operated buses built by Ansair, and was planning a chain of tourist hotels and resorts. In 1949, Ansett Transport Industries was the largest hotel operator in Australia. But by this time, the airline industry had become more competitive with the introduction of the government-subsidised TAA.

In 1957, Ansett took over the struggling ANA company and the two-airline policy was born. Passenger aircraft continued to improve until the first 727 arrived in 1964, introducing jet travel to domestic passengers.

The struggle for ownership of Ansett began in 1973 with several companies interested in a takeover of Ansett and its 40 subsidiaries. Eventually, TNT (Sir Peter Abeles) and News Corp (Rupert Murdoch) were successful. But Abeles and Murdoch resigned five years later and the company became Ansett Holdings - 50% owned by Air NZ - which began selling off its non-core assets (including Hayman Island for \$61.5m, which had cost \$300 million). After a series of problems due to poor decisions by Air NZ and ageing aircraft, the business was haemorrhaging money. In September, 2002, Air NZ offered Ansett to Qantas for \$1! The offer was refused - a black day indeed for the company and Australia.

saganaki, kroketes, louraniko, lamb souvlaki, calamari, gyros and biftekia; roughly meaning grilled goat's cheese, sausage, calamari and white bait, spit-roasted lamb, beef rissoles. But there was more. The owner and chef, Theo (and Mrs Theo), sprang a surprise and provided complimentary Greek sweets and desserts with our tea and coffee!

Two interesting Victorian wines were sampled - a 2004 Water Wheel (Bendigo) shiraz, a brilliant deep purple in colour with some strong berry and vanilla characteristics and a soft richness on the palate - as well as a Delatite riesling. Nobody seemed to mind paying \$15 for them.
