Insurance Breakthrough

There has been a significant change in the Probus travel insurance from 1/12/2010. Previously, it was only available on Probus trips; however, it is now available for Probus members and their partners on both Probus and private travels. The new key feature is that it covers pre-existing illnesses providing the travellers have a letter from their doctor stating that they "are fit to travel". The premium for overseas travel is \$180 for trips of up to 90 days and \$120 for travel within Australia. Medical cover is provided up to \$100,000. NOTE: For those over 80, illnesses that lead to cancellation prior to travel commencing are not covered but illnesses while travelling are covered. The full details are available on the Probus South Pacific website. This could be a major benefit to those members who may otherwise be deterred from travelling due to pre-existing illnesses which preventing them from getting travel insurance. Each interested member needs to read the fine print to ensure that they are satisfied with the extent of the cover.



The Forgotten Regiment

Capt Brian Burton, our keynote speaker for November, is the author and publisher of The Forgotten Regiment. His history of the Royal Gloucester Hussars, formed in 1760, covered their involvement in the North African campaign during World War 2. Hostilities began in 1940 with attacks by the Italian Army intending to push through Egypt and capture the Suez Canal but Allied forces including many Australian troops inflicted considerable defeats. As a result, the Italians withdrew with heavy losses and in disarray, calling upon the Germans for assistance. Field Marshal Rommel arrived with a strong force which became known as the Afrika Korps. When Rommel captured the garrison at Tobruk which had been under siege for nine months, he continued his advance into Egypt but was eventually stopped by the British Eighth Army which included units from Australia and other Commonwealth forces at El Alamein. Brian Burton served in the regiment during the various phases of the campaign and was severely wounded in one of the battles. After his presentation, Brian engaged in conversation with some of our members who were veterans of the same campaign. Alan Williams

Memories of Manangatang

Don Cameron's 10-minute talk on Family Recollections at the November meeting began in Manangatang where he was born. His early days were, in Don's words, "pretty black" after the death of his father in 1941 from injuries he sustained in World War 1 and as a result of his family, with little money, living in rented accommodation. Eventually, they decided to move to Melbourne where they lived with relatives in the Brighton area. Don attended Brighton Beach State school becoming great friends with a Ross Austin where life for Don began to pick up as the two boys embarked on a series of escapades rivalling those of the immortal Ginger Meggs and other Boys Own heroeswhich included making bombs from explosives found in a neighbouring shed, travelling on trains without tickets and generally doing what many young boys did for amusement in those days. How To Survive a Heart Attack When Alone

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, without help the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint has only about ten seconds left before losing consciousness.

What to do? Answer:

- O Do not panic, but start coughing repeatedly and very vigorously
- O A deep breath should be taken before each cough. The cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest
- O A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives or until the heart is felt to be beating again

Why? Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing squeezes the heart and keeps blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to hospital.

Did You Know? A Few Demographic Facts


