In this regard, we are very fortunate to have Paul Crompton as Keynote Speaker on January 20 at the Mentone RSL club and I ask Members to make a special effort to be present to support him and hear and view what will be a fascinating presentation.

At our November Meeting, I was delighted to welcome new Members Bruce Tomkins, Gordon Long and Geoff Bransbury. With an average age of 70 years between them, this is an encouragingly positive move for our club in reducing our overall average age level. Also, a list has been prepared of the interests and hobbies of Members, grouping together those with similar interests. The aim is that perhaps Members with similar interests will get together and form one or more new groups within the club. A summary of all this information is enclosed with this issue.

On another matter of importance to the Club, I would be pleased to have a volunteer come forward to update the Club History. The existing history - covering the first 15 years of the Club from its formation in 1987 to 2002 - was compiled by Max Parsons and published in July 2002. This is a 97-page document primarily created by taking relevant extracts from past newsletters and is a very important reference which illustrates the enormous range of activities undertaken over the years. We are looking to add a further five years' history which could be put together over, say, the next year or two. I will have a copy available at our next Meeting for viewing by interested Members and would be pleased to hear from anyone who feels able to help us in this regard.

On closing, it is encouraging to note a significant increase in numbers at recent monthly Meetings; in particular, an attendance of 90 in November.

MONTHLY PROFILE Andy Watson



Andy Watson says

Andy isn't keen to be photographed but we caught him here, having a cuppa with Graeme Wearne at one of our Meetings last year

he doesn't play golf, and hates gardening, but he *does* like helping people. That tells us almost everything we need to know about Andy, our genial joke-telling Almoner. As we know, he has a special calling to get involved with other people's problems, keeping in touch by phone or in person.

Andy held a senior supervisory position in retail bespoke men's tailoring and was responsible for 27 shops across southern England, the Isle of Wight and the Channel Islands - holding this position for seven years, before emigrating to California in 1957. He found there wasn't a decent future in the retail trade in the USA, so he joined a major office equipment company. He started as a Junior Salesman, moving to Senior Salesman, then Sales Manager. After being appointed International Marketing Manager, he travelled worldwide to 24 subsidiaries and 89 dealer networks for two and a half years before transferring to Australia as Director of Marketing. After six years in that position, he transferred back to the USA for two years, but, on retiring, he returned to Beaumaris, where he had sensibly leased his house while overseas.

Settled comfortably in Beaumaris, he was able to indulge his interest for helping others through St Martin's Uniting Church by driving a busload of handicapped and elderly people four days a week all over Melbourne on outings. He was one of a group of about 40 men and women volunteers in this venture for 14 years. However, his life as a helper was fulfilled in 1985 when he responded to a call from the Victorian Court Network for volunteers to work with people who find themselves caught up in the court system - people Andy describes as 'victims', though they may be witnesses or relatives of crime victims. Very often, they are simply wandering about the courts, lost or in need of pastoral care. Andy makes contact, explains what is going to happen to them in court, and shows them either an empty court or a 'live' court, before they have to face up to it themselves. "So they don't go in there 'cold'", he says.

He also conducts tours of the Supreme Court for year 11-12 High School students, Law students, legal Secretaries, police cadets, visiting VIP legal practitioners from overseas – and, of course, a multitude of Probus Clubs.

Andy is a Life Member of our Club. It is said that Andy is, perhaps, the most important personality within the Club; firstly, that he maintains contact with those of us who are ill or in any way indisposed. He is the real face of the fellowship that exists between Members of Beaumaris Probus. Secondly, for new members and visitors, he may well be the main distinguishing feature between us and other like groups. An inspiration.

Coal and Climate Change

As our November Keynote Speaker, Rio Tinto Mining Executive Andy Lloyd created much interest about the future of coal in Australia. The importance of coal to our overall economy was quickly apparent to us all. In his opinion, technology development is the key to Australia's approach to climate change; however, international action and collaboration are necessary as breakthroughs will emerge from continuing research in the US and Japan.

In the meantime, not only are we generating 85% of our electricity from coal, it is also our largest export by value. We have sufficient supply of black coal in NSW and Queensland to supply our needs and the needs of our trading partners for 100 years; and brown coal reserves in Victoria are sufficient for 500 years of power generation. The largest users of coal worldwide are China and India, but Australia is the world's biggest emitter of greenhouse gases per head of population specifically because of our dependence on this form of power generation.

Energy alternatives such as wind, solar, geo-thermal and the like are much more expensive and would dramatically increase household costs for energy, so Rio Tinto and others are investigating and trialling methods of 'clean coal' generation to enable the use of their extensive coal deposits well into the future. New technologies such as drying, cleaning and the gasification of coal promise to be able to reduce carbon emissions by 30%.

Andy showed a special DVD explaining in animation how some of these new technologies - carbon capture and storage (CCS) - function. As opposed to allowing CO₂ to escape into the atmosphere, it is proposed to capture and pump carbon under extreme pressure through a pipeline to sites 50 km offshore and approximately 2 km below the seabed, to be stored in cavities in rock formations for centuries. Ideal geological sites exist off the coast of Victoria and in relative close proximity to our brown coal power generating plants which could be used - providing companies who control gas and oil-producing leases in the area can be encouraged to collaborate on the project.

As a result of Andy Lloyd bringing this very important topic to our Meeting, we will watch future activities in the power industry with great interest. Alan Willams

Favoured and pampered travellers in the comfort of contoured recliners, we were whisked along in quiet elegance. Prior to entering Geelong, we turned off to the industrial area which borders Corio Bay. The size of the area surprised everyone with many large and unattractive complexes, mainly servicing the agricultural sector.

At the Eastern Beach waterfront precinct, we were loaded onto the 20-year-old *Freedom* sightseeing launch for a tour around Corio Bay.
