FROM THE PRESIDENT

Another financial year has come to an end and for those who invest in the share market, it has been a year of volatility, culminating in a Greek tragedy on June 30 which saw our share market decline by 2%. The 2007 GFC highlighted weakness within certain economies of the world, especially Ireland, Greece, Italy and Spain. The response by governments was to create cheap money through low interest rates and government deficits in order to stimulate economies. Despite years of deficits, by EU members and the US, attempting to kick start their economies have only been partly successful.

One of the unintended consequences of low interest rates has been a tide of money looking for a home. Some of the money has found its way to hedge funds where a degree of risky investments have been

made. Greece is a classic situation of a country living beyond its means with welfare programs that in the long term have proved to be unsustainable. Greece currently owes 320 billion euro, of which hedge funds hold over 30%. Bond yields have increased to 11% in the last month; youth unemployment is now at 65%; its economy has contracted by 26% since 2007.

The situation in Greece is a salutary lesson for other countries of the consequences of living beyond your means. Creditors tend to be unsympathetic when it comes to money and opportunists look to exploit any situations of weakness. Whilst Greek debt may not be significant by world standards, share markets do not like uncertainty with the prospect of contagion in the minds of investors. Share markets are likely to experience volatility for the foreseeable future.

Tour of Western Treatment Plant and Ramsar Wetlands, Werribee Wednesday September 23

[NOTE: Ramsar wetlands are recognised as a matter of national environmental significance]

We visit the oldest and largest treatment facility in Melbourne Water's assets - many say the best to visit, particularly in springtime. It includes morning tea/coffee, an overview of the facility and a tour of the site comprising the treatment plant, lagoons and Ramsar wetlands, home to many species of birds. Our coach leaves from the Reserve Road Library at 9.30 am to travel to Werribee where the program will commence at 10.30 am with a 20-minute presentation. This will be followed by a 2-hour tour utilising our coach to get around the extensive area.

The tour will finish at about 1 pm. We will stop to have lunch in the Werribee area (at own expense) before arriving back at Beaumaris (about 3 pm). Cost: \$50 per person which covers coach travel, morning tea/coffee on arrival, entrance and tour fees. Please register and pay by September 21.

Travel

5-day, 4-nights trip to the *Floriade* in Canberra from October 5 to 9 - up the Hume Highway and back via the Princes Highway. Highlights include a visit to the Royal Australian Mint, a bus tour of the embassy area, Changi Chapel at Duntroon and many others. Cost: \$930 pp (supp \$280). Hotel accommodation at this time of year is very tight so early bookings are advised.

There is also the opportunity of a 7-day trip which includes a 5-day cruise on the *Proud Mary*, from January 17. The trip includes return air flights to Adelaide, a short sight-seeing tour upon arrival; all meals and accommodation except for lunch on the day of arrival. Travel by bus to Murray Bridge to board the boat (36 people in 18 cabins). All cabins have their own en-suite, individual heating and cooling, and tea and coffee-making facilities. Cost: \$1725 pp twin share (\$2230 for anyone travelling alone). Minimum 10 required to clinch this deal but you will appreciate the need to book early. See brochures with the booking sheet at the functions table.

Lifetime of Transition

Our June Keynote Speaker, Dr Terence Seedsman, from Victoria University spoke about seeing ageing as transition from one aspect of life to another and the singular importance of not only understanding but managing that change. He cited Faith Baldwin's, "Time is a dressmaker specialising in alterations" and John Lennon's famous guip that life is what happens to you while you are busy making other plans. The secret to successful ageing, Terry says, is recognising that growing older involves managing the inevitability of change and the challenge to stay well. Dr Seedsman said that the real challenge of ageing is realising that it is not just an event but a process and our ability to deal with it is what we call change. Change is not merely necessary to life, he said; it is life. Everything comes to pass, nothing comes to stay according to Matthew Flickstein, teacher of insight and meditation.

Time is a dressmaker specialising in alterations

Terry offered three major rules for life:

- All choices and actions have consequences
- You are the only one responsible for your choices and actions
- Failure to accept choice is, in fact, a choice to stop growing and a decision to not move forward.

On change and transition, he believes that transition follows closely after a major change and that often transition for an individual begins with an ending of some aspect of life. He spoke of our negotiating transition in later life. "We need to be positive about change and willing to unfold, evolve, develop and improve." Food for thought.

Don't Say You Didn't Know

A Swedish study (1998 - 2007) followed 45,887 men aged 45 to 79 years of age to investigate the effect of lifetime physical activity on the incidence of prostate cancer. Their results, published in 2009 in the *British Journal of Cancer*, found that men who had the highest physical activity level had a 16 percent decreased risk of developing prostate cancer compared with men with the lowest level of activity. It was estimated that a 30-minute daily period of walking or bicycling reduced the risk of developing prostate cancer by 7 percent.





Behind Enemy Lines

Stories of heroism and other endeavours during war always seem to attract an interested audience. Mike Harwood's account of the missions taken by his cousin, Jack House, were enthralling and gave a fascinating insight into some of the behind-the-lines action during World War 2. Jack was a member of a Raiding Group and Special Boat Squad. Placed behind the lines to support Marshall Tito – they were parachuted into Yugoslavia - they assisted and trained Tito's troops. Later, in Crete, they were told to keep a look out for escaped prisoners; however, on one occasion they stopped a truck and forced the personnel to alight, without realising that they had intercepted a convoy of the Commandant of Crete. In France, they were sent in to set up flares for allied gliders coming into Normandy but not being able to remember their passwords (given them by the Americans), they had to improvise.
