10-Minute Speaker: Paul Crompton Blazeaid

Professor Sandiford is Director of the Melbourne Energy Institute and Professor of Geology at the University of Melbourne. As director of the Institute, he oversees the University energy research portfolio and has been responsible for developing its focus on the opportunities and challenges of integration of low emission technologies in large-scale, sustainable energy systems.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

Over 75% of our electricity generation comes from coal but solar hot water usage has trebled in the last five years, although renewable energy accounts for only 5% of energy consumption. Over the last 30 years electricity prices have gone up by a factor of five; however, our electricity is still quite inexpensive by global standards and petrol prices are low by global standards as well. Taking the bus is not much more efficient than driving a



car; and sending goods on trains is far more energy efficient than our current preference for trucks. The most energy efficient state in Australia is Victoria (thanks to a service industry focus); the least is Western Australia (thanks to a mining industry focus).

When I was a very young lad, I must have had a predilection for looking downwards at the footpath as I walked because my father often berated me with one of his aphorisms, "Look up and live." Although I'm not sure why I did it initially, looking down often brought great rewards - there were sometimes interesting things that others had dropped lying on the footpath or in the grass. #### **Keynote Speakers 2013**

In the coming months, we will be hearing Keynote Speakers on the subject of Refugees and Asylum Seekers, research into the development of the Bionic Eye and exotic tales of a VRC Handicapper.

#### A Little Burst of Sunshine

Immunologist and Senior Scientist at the Walter and Eliza Institute, Dr Margo Honeyman, presented a strong case for embracing the benefits of Vitamin D. While it can be accessed by exposing our skin to sunlight 10-15 minutes twice a week, supplementary capsules should be taken during the winter months when sunshine or UV concentration is limited. Tests have indicated that Vitamin D has an important effect on the immune system and could assist in reducing the risk of developing diseases such as diabetes, MS, cancer and heart disease. It has also been found to be crucial to aid the absorption and metabolism of calcium and phosphorous in maintaining healthy bones, avoiding osteoporosis in the elderly and rickets in children. In a lively and graphic presentation, Dr Honeyman detailed studies showing the people most at risk of Vitamin D deficiency live in latitudes further from the equator, such as the UK where many Asian migrants were found to have a high incidence of TB as a direct result of a lack of Vitamin D, including Muslim women who cover themselves avoiding any exposure to sunlight. In Australia for some years, we have assiduously protected school-age children from the sun but studies now show there is a risk of a higher incidence of asthma occurring in those with low Vitamin D levels. #### The Mackinnons of Mooramong

Thanks to Lloyd Jenkins for his tale of the life and times of Scobie Mackinnon, son of LKS Mackinnon, of the racing fraternity's Mackinnon Stakes fame. In 1927, to celebrate Scobie's 21st birthday, he gave his son Mooramong, a sheep station located near Skipton in the Western District. At the age of 31, Scobie went to London on holiday where he met Claire Adams, a retired silent movie actress; they married after a threeweek whirlwind courtship returning, to Mooramong where, in spite of many sniping predictions, they lived out their lives in blissful harmony supporting the local council, hospital and the many charities in the district. Scobie enjoyed his Rolls Royce cars including a Silver Ghost to travel to Melbourne and parties in Ballarat. Meanwhile, Claire converted the homestead into an art deco Hollywood mansion which is now owned and maintained by the National Trust and can be viewed along with collectables and artifacts reminiscent of that era. Claire and Scobie died in the 1970s but their Mackinnon Trust still makes considerable donations to the local school and a range of other beneficiaries.
