FROM THE PRESIDENT

"...unbridled humanity and respect for others and the law..."

No-one has ever asked me for a list of my heroes and maybe that's a good thing. Revealing who we most admire often speaks more about ourselves than we care to divulge. In my case, it would include many of the usual suspects. But I would also make a case for Saul of Tarsus who, before the age of travel, walked to small communities at the extremities of the Greek and Roman Empire to tell people to love one another not hate; Galileo Galllei who was imprisoned, abused and ex-communicated for knowing what almost noone else did at the time, that the Earth revolved around the Sun; and an unknown self-taught Englishman named William Smith who, for the first time in recorded history, investigated, mapped and named the layers of rock beneath his (and our) feet - The Map that Changed the World, his biographer called his achievement. However, as an Australian, I would reserve the strongest case for Captain Arthur Phillip, a gentleman of the Enlightenment, whose unbridled humanity and respect for others and the law, paved the way for the establishment of one of the fairest. most egalitarian societies on the planet. Far from the

barbaric invader that many of today's schoolchildren may well come to believe him, Phillip was a man of principle with a vision for the future and we are all the beneficiaries of his vision. Yet I am also inspired by the number of fine people around me in this Probus organisation; people who are both selfless and caring, people with a generosity of spirit and time, who through their actions enrich the lives of others. It is a privilege to be a member of Beaumaris Probus.

Finally, a last word. But no matter what I say, nothing will come even close in impact to what probably are the most famous last words of all time; namely, the reported 'last words' of comic genius Spike Milligan - who, in fact, penned them long before he died in 2002 but which have nevertheless been immortalised on his headstone: "I told you I was sick." In my case, nothing as memorable, but while I still have time and the space, I wish to thank members for giving me the rare opportunity over the past year to serve as your President and work towards fostering the interests of this great club and its advancement.

From Somalia to Brighton Keynote Speaker Mariam Issa being thanked by Peter McGregor



Somalia is country of poets and pirates where tribal wars are common and a culture of clans is strictly adhered to - often leading to violence between neighbours. This country of extremes was the home of Mariam Issa, our February Keynote Speaker, who told stories of her life living in remote villages. Family culture decrees that priority of education be extended to boys but Mariam, attending the village school under the mango tree, determined to educate herself and eventually become the well-educated, emancipated woman she is today. Eventually, she and her husband and four children fled the country. After many trials and tribulations, she obtained the necessary visas to Australia, arriving in 1998. Mariam started working as a cleaner to integrate with white women in their homes and enrolling her children in the local schools. She created an organisation called RAW (Resilient Aspiring Women) inviting all women in the neighbourhood to join. Describing her community work as 'practical multiculturalism', she hopes to change our perception of Africa and the African people.

50 Years in the Car Industry

Keith Ross' career in the motor industry began in the early 1960s when employed as an apprentice motor mechanic with Ford, after which he worked in a dealership marketing the Ford Falcon which was challenging Holden, a major player in the Australian family car



market. At the time, annual production of cars in Australia was around 204 000 which would grow through the 1970s - with the assistance of high tariffs on imported cars - to more than 498 000. He then joined Honda marketing their excellent motor cycles and establishing their brand in cars at the quality end of the market. When Toyota began manufacturing in Australia, sales of locally-built cars reached 30 000 annually, whilst imported car sales reached 179 000. Obviously, this was where future profit priorities would lie. The motor industry today is a world-wide industry without boundaries — even some Korean brands are made in Eastern Europe and some of the European brands are made in Mexico.
