Easy Rider

Remember this guy? Oh what an adventure - Kathmandu to Calcutta on a motorbike via Nepal, India and Bhutan. Geoff Bransbury told us of his epic journey travelling on his Royal Enfield, a 1950s style motorbike. He completed the ride in a group of six riders and survived to bring us his stories — and slide



show - which gave us an insight into the highs and lows of life in these countries. He pointed out the problems navigating the traffic on inadequate road systems, in company with mass pedestrians – not to mention assorted cows, pigs, goats and dogs - all competing with the many trucks who had their own set of rules. Overhead were power lines dangling from poles like spaghetti. But the small country of Bhutan bordered by India, Tibet and China, captured his imagination with its magnificent countryside, and 15th century monasteries perched on cliff faces high in the mountains with welcoming families informing him that most Bhutan people believe that "Wealth is measured not in terms of GDP but happiness".* Apart from the odd landslide, Geoff had a wonderful holiday and with plenty of happiness. The Fascinating World of Coastal Geomorphology

Eric Bird is editor of an encyclopaedia documenting the world's coastlines. Arriving in Australia in 1957, he found a limited supply of textbooks available on the subject of coastal landforms, so he travelled across Australia gathering information and wrote his own. In 1972, a working group was formed to study coastal landforms across the entire world. They studied every country and most of the islands in between, a total distance approximating 1 000 000 km, beginning in Alaska and finally completing the survey in Antarctica! In Bayside, we have concerns about beach erosion and apparently this is common to 70% of the world's beaches and has been for centuries. Our options are barriers such as the Black Rock bluestone walkway, groynes such as those used on Sandringham beaches, or artificial beaches or sand re-nourishment. Eric insisted that options such as these are essential to maintaining our beaches and the cliffs behind. He said to remember that the 12 Apostles standing out in the ocean near Port Campbell were once part of the cliff face! Alan Williams
