### FROM THE PRESIDENT

## "These experiences substantially increase our understanding of the Great War"

This is being written with ANZAC Day approaching and it is worth highlighting that this year and next are special anniversaries for both Australia and ANZAC history. Most will know that 2014 is the centenary of World War 1 and 2015 is the centenary of the ANZAC landing at Gallipoli. There has been much publicity given to next year's memorial ceremonies at Gallipoli with many thousands involved in a ballot for the very limited places available.

Fortunately, as a family we have not had significant involvement in these conflicts but from a personal point of view I have researched and written about all those who have been involved. One was a relatively uneducated farm boy, David Bernard Harford, from Western Australia who had the foresight to keep a diary. This recorded all of his war experiences up to the moment he was killed in 1917 by a shell exploding near him at a Field Hospital away from the trenches.

In about 1930, David's mother provided his diary to the Australian War Memorial and it is now being used as part of the Memorial's Centenary Commemoration Projects. These involve an extensive on-line display of a comprehensive selection of private records from their collection, sharing the stories and experiences of service personnel through their diaries, letters, postcards and photographs. Also David's diary has been digitised and displayed on-line.

Elizabeth and I have been fortunate to have visited the battlefield sites at the Somme (including David Bernard's grave at Pozieres) and also Gallipoli, and shortly we will also visit the Flanders battlefields. These experiences substantially increase our understanding of the Great War and the harsh conditions under which our soldiers lived and fought - not to mention the significant destruction of human life and the devastation to towns and villages.

#### Annual Candlelight Dinner Thursday July 17





## Olympic Glory: Living the Dream

As a nine-year-old schoolgirl from nearby Parkdale, Nicole Livingstone dreamt of becoming a member of the Australian Olympic swimming team. After some years of junior swimming and 30-hour-a-week training schedules, she achieved her dream in 1985. As one of our elite Olympic swimmers, she won the Women's Backstroke national title for 10 consecutive years and retired in 1996 having represented Australia in three Olympic Games, Commonwealth Games and World Championships, the winner of many gold, silver and bronze medals.

Back in 1912, ladies were not encouraged to swim in Olympic competition. Nevertheless Australians 'Fanny' Durack and Mina Wylie paid their own fare to compete and won gold and silver respectively in the 100-yard freestyle event. As Nicole said, "Aussie girls have been winning gold ever since!"

In the 1988 Olympics, Nicole felt quite intimidated by the East German 'girls' who were bigger and stronger athletes than most male competitors. It was obvious they were using special hormonal substances as they swept all before them in that year. In response to questions about the failure of our Olympic swimming team to perform to expectations in London. Nicole felt the culture in the team was not as team-focused as in previous Olympic bids when, for example, every member attended poolside to cheer other Aussie team-mates in their races. Despite changes of coaches and support staff, she said, Australia will still face strong competition in future Olympics because the rest of the world has caught up to our former Golden Years in the pool. The construction of the deck beneath Melbourne's Federation Square is one of the largest expanses of railway decking ever built in Australia. The deck is supported by over 3,000 tonnes of steel beams, 1.4 kilometres of concrete 'crash walls' and over 4,000 vibration-absorbing spring coils and rubber padding.
