In 1980, he became Chief Handicapper for the VRC, handicapping a record 25 Melbourne Cups. In 1998, he was admitted as a member of the International Ratings Panel. When he retired from Racing Victoria in 2004, he commenced as Racing Manager for the Lloyd Williams' racing group, retiring in 2009 so as to be able to play more golf.

#### **Probus Travel Insurance**

There have been significant recent improvements to the Probus travel insurance policy. The great benefit of the Probus policy is that it covers pre-existing illnesses including diseases such as cancer without a special extra charge (if they will cover you at all.) To be covered, you only need a letter from your medical advisor dated less than six months prior to travel stating that "you are fit to travel " - to be included with your application for insurance. Probus now offers cover until 30 May 2014 instead of (previously) 30 November 2013. The cover, is a little less than the normal travel insurance and typical cost is \$245 per person for up to 90 days beyond Australia and New Zealand.



Unfortunately, our September Keynote Speaker, Jo Swarc, left us with more problems than solutions. A wide disparity of opinion has been fuelled by the rapid increase in asylum seekers, from 21 people in 2007/8 to 25 000 in 2012/13. According to Jo, finding a way to control the numbers, stop the queue-jumpers and the drownings is complicated. Refugees are fleeing possible death, so no deterrent will stop them trying to escape to a safer environment. In addition to the many illegal asylum seekers, Australia welcomes thousands annually who come here legally with proper documentation from UN-controlled refugee camps in nearby countries. But we are not alone! As our community is aware, there is a worldwide problem of refugees and asylum seekers searching for a new beginning. However, we would all like to find a way to limit the complex social problems that we see in some migrant communities in major cities in Europe and the UK in particular. Jo calls it 'Risk versus Generosity.'



#### No Jolly Time To Be Alive

Waltzing Matilda, our famous and probably bestknown Australian folk song, is now the subject of a book written by Dennis O'Keeffe, a friend of our 10minute speaker, Rod Kelly. Cited many times as an alternative to our National Anthem, it was once used inadvertently during the Olympic Games in Helsinki in 1952. What we know about it is that in 1894, bush poet 'Banjo' Patterson attended a social evening at Dagworth station 950km west of Rockhampton where a family friend, Christina McPherson, was playing an old Scottish song on the piano which appealed to him - as did the pianist! He scribbled a few words to fit the tune and Waltzing Matilda was the result. There was no happy ending to the brief romance and in 1902, needing cash to marry a lady in Tenterfield, he sold the lyrics for five pounds. Dennis O'Keeffe suggests the words have been changed over the years as the tale does not accurately reflect the mood of the times in which it was written. There was nothing 'jolly' about the poverty and loneliness tramping the roads looking for work, humping a swag, surrounded by the violence and the deprivation of the Shearers' Strike. It seems also that he did not jump into the billabong either, but was shot dead for stealing a jumbuck. Alan Williams
