
Shareholders United

Victorian Chairman of the Shareholders Association, Ian Curry, spoke to the Investment Group about some of his central concerns as a shareholder. He called for more open reporting to shareholders and deplored the fact that often executive remuneration was increased substantially at a time that the share price and dividends of a company were, as he described it, 'slaughtered'. He also discussed some of the implications of requiring 50% women on boards.

Word Origins

For those who have been doing a fair bit of barracking in recent weeks, you may be interested to know where this unique Australianism came from. You won't find its use anywhere else in the world. It started with cricket and the Sydney Cricket Ground back in the 19th century. The ground was built adjacent to the historic Army Barracks and it was customary, whenever there was a game of cricket, for the men and officers to congregate at that part of the outer and imbibe and heckle or encourage the cricketers as the day wore on. They were always very vociferous and enthusiastic and this was called 'barracking' because it was those lads from the barracks again - and so the word entered the vernacular. Ed.

Mr Franchise Comes to Town Alan Williams At the September meeting, Roger Wilson gave a 10-minute but forceful insight into the world of franchising, the result of his own experiences with the bedding franchise operation, Forty Winks, which he joined in 1987. Roger is passionate about the many successful businesses that have achieved considerable growth using the franchising strategy and he cites Harvey Norman, Bendigo Bank and McDonald's as amongst the best. There are currently 70 000 businesses in Australia operating under a franchise agreement turning over some \$130 billion annually. One of the very interesting examples is Gloria Jean's coffee, which was developed here in Australia and operates world-wide in 7000 outlets.

Geoff had a long career in retailing, beginning with GJ Coles as a junior in sales in 1947. When he retired in 1987 at the age of 57 after 40 years with the same company, he began a small local handyman business which "kept me busy for a few years." He made the decision to join Probus in 1988 and, eventually, he came to the view that he should 'pull his weight' and soon became the Meeting Co-ordinator in 1995, President in 1997, Assistant Functions 2002-03, and Secretary 2003-05. What he loves most about the Beaumaris Club is the number of new people joining. "I'm thrilled to think that there are so many people coming into the club

with fresh ideas," he says.

Geoff has been a member of the Beaumaris Motor Yacht Squadron for about 30 years. He says most of the activity at the club is about fishing; 99 per cent. A very passionate supporter of the Melbourne Football Club, his other main interest is bowls; he has been a member at Sandringham for 23 years, twice serving as President of Men's Division. He is proud of the fact that he was able to put his sons through Mentone Grammar and his daughter through Firbank; and is pleased that he and his wife still maintain a strong association with them all. These days his primary recreation is travelling with Yvonne, his wife of 58 years: from Amsterdam to Budapest earlier this year, and then New Caledonia with Gabriel Gate recently. He says he has an ongoing love affair with Australia - including Broome to Darwin by land two years ago, a trip to Lake Eyre in 2009, Cairns to Cape York previously and, he hopes, from Broome to Darwin in 2011. Clearly, Geoff and Yvonne are busy living life to the full.
