FROM THE PRESIDENT

So what is a wise man? He has a clear sense of who he is and what he is supposed to do

While cycling is an aid to maintaining good health - a view Noel Ineson certainly supports - last month, Gabriel Gaté provided another aspect of the Tour de France: its tastes. His wisdom, experience and charisma led many of us to think about planning a trip to France to enjoy the food and wine. But I was also impressed by the wisdom and experience shown by our members at that meeting when they agreed to discuss the pros and cons of difficult subjects. Over the years, members of Beaumaris Probus have proven themselves to be well endowed with wisdom - a priceless possession. Since before the time of King Solomon, wisdom has been associated with making judgements or decision-making, a skill often used by professional and business people. So, what is wisdom? Wisdom may be experience. defined as a special ability to perceive, to grasp the essential elements of a situation and judge and act accordingly. One idea from Aristotle was *phronesis*, or practical wisdom, a bridge between the intellectual and the moral; more than mere intelligence. Humility appears to be one vital ingredient of wisdom: the Old Testament's Proverbs (11:2), states, "When pride comes, then comes disgrace, but

with humility comes wisdom." In the New Testament, the writer of James (3:13), says, "Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom." The Buddhist tradition of *prajn*a claims to offer the wisdom of liberation from delusion and craving for things beyond our control. So what is a wise man? He has a clear sense of who he is and what he is supposed to do, where he is going and how to be happy in the face of suffering and death. He is able to make the right decisions amidst confusions, tensions and competing interests. However, we can over-emphasise intelligence to the detriment of other equally valuable attributes, including scientific knowledge, methods and

France, Food & Cycling



Gabriel has just finalized a series of four-minute SBS television programs introducing the different food and wine specialities of the regions through which the Tour de France passes

Keynote Speaker for June, Gaelic gourmet Gabriel Gaté - a culinary legend since his arrival in Australia in 1977 and marrying here - guaranteed most of his audience will be tuned to the nightly Tour de France cycling reports on SBS starting July 2. Gabriel has recently finalised a series of four-minute television introductions to the many food and wine specialities along the world-renowned Tour's twenty-one stages. After Day One at the island of Noirmoutier. home of fabulous fresh seafood, we then heard about the special buckwheat pancakes of Brittany, visited on Day Two. Next came the delicious camembert cheese area of Normandy and the Calvados brandy derived from local apples; and on through the Loire Valley, where we learnt about the magnificent goat cheeses and a special Vouvray Chenin Blanc. The Tour progresses through Bordeaux and Provence - where Gabriel explained the intricacies of nougatmaking-before surging over the Alps to Turin where our French maestro praised the variety of Italian cooking. This year, the finishing run is through Grenoble, the heart of the walnut region and on to Paris and the final sprint around the Champs Elysées, in a city dear to his epicurean heart with its over three hundred fresh food markets. Gabriel's most appreciative audience will surely be amongst the many followers of his introductory culinary treats prior to the (late) nightly live tour reports. Alan Trimble
