



Afflicted with MS as a young man, Steven learnt that he could still achieve much



From Depths to the Heights

At the June meeting, members heard an inspiring story from Steven van Ruyven (Menno's son) who was afflicted with the autoimmune disease known as multiple sclerosis in 1996 at the age of 32. MS occurs when the immune system attacks the nerve cells in the brain and spinal chord. It affects the ability of nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord to communicate with each other effectively. With no known cure, the damage is irreparable. Symptoms can include fatigue, blurred vision, vertigo, loss of feeling in fingers, weakness in the limbs, or walking difficulties - Steven had all of the above. Medication can slow deterioration of the condition, but increasing vitamin D levels - for example, daily supplements plus maximum skin exposure to the summer sun for 10 minutes daily - appear to have a beneficial effect. He learnt to cope by planning a slower lifestyle and taking challenges such as climbing Sydney Harbour Bridge and learning a trapeze circus act in Singapore, in spite of his vertigo problems and some very painful after-effects. He believes physical activity - including long bicycle rides - is delaying further deterioration and his message to others is, "Keep going - do whatever you can." Alan Williams

Good Way to Lose Money

In his own inimitable way, John Laing treated us to some inside information on the thoroughbred horse breeding and racing industry. History is littered with stories of successes and failures of great horses, jockeys and trainers, including the amazing story of Northerly, an Australian champion. After surviving a difficult birth, during which the horse actually died, it was considered by all the experts a hopeless case to race successfully; remarkably, it amassed \$9.3 million in prize money! But not all stories have a happy ending; for example, two foals from triple Melbourne Cup winner Makybe Diva - purchased for \$1.5m and \$1.2m respectively - returned only \$17 825 and \$6 500 to their owners. With the average cost of owning a race horse approximately \$30 000 per year, he says, you should always hope yours is a winner! Most aren't. Alan Williams
