#### FROM THE PRESIDENT



#### **Ken Beadle**

At our last meeting in July, Barry Hooper gave a master class on the issues associated with electric power generation and supply security (a detail report of which is given on page 5). Barry also coped well with our microphone problems – he is used to lecturing to Chemical Engineering students at Melbourne University. The Federal Government's response to the Finkel Report is expected to be released soon, arguably the most important policy setting of 2017. Unfortunately, all recent governments have been blind to the huge problems caused by the lack of firm policy on new power generation facilities and now show lamentable ignorance on the costs and time required to design and install new power generation and storage systems. Inevitably, electricity prices will continue to rise without government support if Barry's trilemma of reduced CO<sub>2</sub> emissions, a mix of power generation technologies and security of supply remains unresolved.

About 50 completed the questionnaires that were handed in at our last meeting, an encouraging number from the 65 members attending. This survey is a great opportunity for all members to make constructive suggestions on improvements and new initiatives that they would like to see as well as being given the opportunity to register an interest to participate in the management of our club. Members who have not yet responded are requested to fax, email or mail their completed questionnaires to me by August 9. I will be analysing your responses and preparing a summary for discussion at the August Management Committee meeting. #### **Clean Power Generation**

Sub-Zero Hero: Two Winters in Antarctica



Under the amusing heading of "Memoirs of a Sub-Zero Hero", David Dodd told us of his two winters in Antarctica in 1955. At the age of 21 years, David worked as a weather observer for the Department of Meteorology at Macquarie Island, situated about half-way between New Zealand and Australia and which became part of Tasmanian in 1948. Now a World Heritage site and home to about 90 people, it is completely self- sufficient. Inhabited by many thousands of King Penguins and with eco-tourism thriving, the island was recently cleared of feral cats and other vermin at a cost of \$49 million. Minus temperatures are the norm. David then spoke about Heard and McDonald Islands, both of which are Australian Territories. Located 4000 kilometres southwest of the Australian mainland, they each contain an active volcano. Of particular interest was the fact that Heard Island was established in 1947 but was abandoned after five years due to supply difficulties and is currently uninhabited. John Bushby

In his July address, Keynote Speaker Barry Hooper started with a YouTube video on why reducing our carbon emissions matters. <a href="CLICK HERE">CLICK HERE</a>. On the subject of renewable sources of energy, Barry said that foremost among the current problems of solar and wind power was the lack of reliability in creating and storing energy. He then set out to convince us why carbon capture and storage (CCS) is required to achieve clean power generation in Australia. He said that there is a need to balance CO2 emissions with climate control given that science had finally established that major cuts to CO2 emissions are necessary, a fact recognised since the 1930s when the connection between the rise in temperatures and emissions was first correlated.

CCS is effected by compressing the emissions and injecting them as a dense fluid into porous rock, the eventual outcome of which is to turn emissions into rock itself – in fact, trapped kilometres beneath the surface, in similar locations to oil and natural gas. The good news is that there are already CCS sites operating in the North Sea (UK), in the Otways (between Warrnambool and Port Campbell) and in Western Australia. With the costs of development having reduced by 30% in recent times, Australia is looking to develop several large-scale projects.

#### Global Economic Issues – July

Members who braved the chilly early morning start on July 18 received a master class presentation from the Grattan Institute's Dr Jim Minifie on Australian Investment in a Low-Growth World. Jim's graphs and tables made for easy understanding of many recent world economic performances. In his view, the boom economic conditions of the noughties are unlikely to return. However, Jim's analysis shows that Australia will remain at or very near the top of slower growth in all developed world economies.
