## What Tunnel Boring Machines Do

In recent times, a network of new rail tunnels has been built across London by eight giant tunnel boring machines, to carry Crossrail's trains eastbound and westbound. Each tunnel is 21 kilometres long, 6.2 metres in diameter and up to 40 metres below ground. Over the last three years, eight 1,000 tonne tunnel boring machines (TBMs) have bored



42km of new 6.2 diameter rail tunnels under London. The machines were operated by 'tunnel gangs' of 20 people, working in shifts around the clock to construct the tunnels, carving out around 3.4 million tonnes of earth. Teams of dedicated workers have been working 24 hours a day to complete the tunnels for Europe's largest civil engineering project. The tunnels weave their way between existing underground lines, sewers, utility tunnels and building foundations from station to station at depths of up to 42m. <a href="More tunnels for Eredit: Crossrail">More</a> [Credit: Crossrail]

#### The King's Grand Vision

Kevin Norris (without fluency in Arabic) is CEO of a transportation service company in Saudi Arabia which was established to encourage and assist more girls and students in urban and remote areas of the country to attend school through to the end of secondary level. Kevin spends two-week periods in every 6-8 weeks working in Riyadh. Saudi Arabia has 25 Universities (with plans for another two) and 207,000 students studying at overseas universities.

# "School facilities in many areas are poor and unsuitable"

When the changes to the education system were actioned four years ago, emphasis was placed on improvements for girls and boys including those from remote areas. The company was formed in a reform program focusing on moving teaching away from the traditional method of memorisation and rote learning to one of analysis and problemsolving. It also encouraged a more secular and practical approach. Kevin described some of the obstacles that hinder progress: cultural differences between different tribes, long-distant travel by both teachers and students on dilapidated roads, unsafe buses, bad drivers and corruption. School facilities in many areas are poor and unsuitable. Kevin's company continues its efforts to introduce a modern linked computer system but at best the collection of data is haphazard and often of little use. His options to overcome the range of current problems include: operating some of the services themselves, building a proper tendering service, dealing directly with safety and security issues, strategic partnerships with investors, and dealing with cultural issues. All this in the context of a young population seeking its own destiny. Something to think about!! John Bushby
