David Parkin attended Melbourne High School and during his time there was the school vice-captain and captain of football. A former Aussie Rules footballer and four-time premiership coach, he played 211 games with Hawthorn in a football career spanning 1961 to 1974 where he was captain from 1969 to 1973, including the premiership in 1971, and later coached the Hawks to a premiership in 1978. He coached three premiership teams for Carlton in

1981, 1982 and 1995. In 2013, David Parkin received a Medal of The Order of Australia for his contribution to Australian Football and is an Australia Day Ambassador.

Girt: The Unauthorised History of Australia by David Hunt

Not everyone enjoys reading history; in fact, amongst young people it seems to be a most unpopular activity. But I do and I found this quirky retelling of Australian history highly entertaining. It contains all the usual characters and events from early exploration and discovery by Europeans to the turbulent days of Sydney Cove. However, it has a unique and surprising perspective.

For example: "Many First Fleet convicts had stolen food to ward off starvation. William Edmunds was transported for stealing a cow, while Thomas Eccles was exiled for filching bacon and two loaves of bread. If Elizabeth Beckford had joined forces with these criminal masterminds, the cheese and bacon burger would have been invented 140 years earlier." It's a lot of fun and a very good read for anyone with even a smattering of interest in Australian history.

GM and the March of Science



The use of GM cotton in Australia has increased farm revenue by \$1.27B

Kevin Reed's 10-minute talk began with a critique of generic opposition to genetic manipulation (GM). Fear of GM is reminiscent of the protests that the Vaccination Act of 1853 evoked in Britain. In fact, development of genetic engineering began about 40 years ago and products entered commerce in 1982 (human insulin). GM technology has made further changes to medicine by the production from GM microbes such as vaccines and interferons.





181.5 million hectares of GM crops were grown in 28 different countries in 2014.

The imposition of extreme protocols for GM plants have impeded progress with tragic consequences for countries where, for example, GM crops could improve vitamin nutrition. Crops in the Americas that rely on GM include maize, soybean, sugar beet, canola and cotton. A GM microbe-produced enzyme is widely used in cheese-making. GM crops have raised yield and profits and lowered pesticide use. In Australia, use of GM cotton has increased farm revenue by \$1.27B. Kevin urged members to study the facts and insist on credible evidence.

Ron Casey, Cyclone Tracy & Me Peter McGregor

As a teenager starting work in radio at 3YB Warrnambool, Keynote Speaker Mal Walden could never have imagined the many illustrious years of reporting and reading the news that lay ahead of him; almost six decades, in fact. When he is asked how he managed to survive so long in such a fickle and competitive industry, he replies: being in the right place at the right time (that is, lucky) and being aware that it is not what you know but who you know that counts most.

With a job at 3DB, Mal had the good fortune to make the acquaintance of Ron Casey who, as his News boss, encouraged him to train as a journalist. After a stint backpacking and working in a kibbutz in Israel, Mal returned to Australia and approached Casey seeking a job (who, in turn, approached the News Director at Channel 7). As a result, he was offered a lowly position as a booth announcer, only to have the night's news reader call in sick and be offered the opportunity to read the news - on his first night. That led him to World of Sport - a mixture of chaos and confusion, he says - where he met Lou Richards, Jack Dyer, Bob Davis and the rest of the motley crew. "It showed me how easy it was to stuff up," he says; but perhaps the most fun was hearing Jack Dyer's malapropisms, such as "At Kardinia Park on Saturday, Geelong finally copulated" (instead of 'capitulated'). Mal remembers that his earliest assignment as a journalist for Channel 7 was to interview the very first Tattslotto winner and, soon after, to report from Darwin on the devastation caused by Cyclone Tracy - and was the first to send back to the studio in Melbourne graphic evewitness accounts of the devastation, firmly establishing his reputation as a journalist of note.

But Mal also saw at first hand the devastation caused, initially at Channel 7, after it was bought by Sydney-based Fairfax (which led to his sacking) and later at Channel Ten following the appointment by James Packer of his good friend Lachlan Murdoch. The News Department employed 57 people when he first joined them; there were only six when he left in 2013 (today, eight). Sadly, Mal said, News everywhere is only a shadow of its former self and most follow the dictum, "If it bleeds, it leads" - a reference to television's propensity to put the sensational first. In retirement, he has had time to smell the roses. "Retirement gives you time to connect the dots," Mal says, "after more than 50 years." The result is two books published and another on the way.
