FROM THE PRESIDENT


Discussion Groups

Profiles

GRAHAM BALL

Living in a damp and dark home in East Malvern, Graham's formative years at school were at Lloyds Street State School and Malvern Grammar (now Caulfield Grammar). His learning was somewhat distracted by the fact that his mind and energy were concentrated on sports such as Aussie Rules, cricket, swimming, athletics, gymnastics and golf, obtain School Colours for swimming, athletics, and gymnastics. But his love of sport strongly affected his academic subjects; hence he failed to obtain the Intermediate Certificate – which meant he was taken out of school by his father who felt his time would be better served by joining the family business in a new Stafford Ellinson suit.



Known as M. Ball & Company, it comprised four stores with 40 years' experience in retailing men's and ladies' apparel, soft furnishings, home textiles, dress fabrics, manchester and haberdashery. To obtain full knowledge and understanding of the industry, he spent two years part-time at the Melbourne School of Textiles. Some 30 years later, he was running the business having overseen such dramatic changes as decimal currency and the introduction of Bankcard. During that same period, Graham concentrated on his sporting prowess in the game of golf, reaching a scratch handicap, winning Spring Valley Golf Club's championships and representing the state of Victoria as a junior state representative. His remarkable contribution of 67 years to the Club included 20 years of pennant, 26 years on the Greens Committee, 21 years on the Match Committee and 14 years on the Board, including being appointed Club Captain. During his time with Spring Valley, he was offered Life Membership and is now the longest-standing continuous member (69 years). A shoulder injury in a car accident at 18 years of age eventually took him out of the game he loved dearly; and his new sport is now golf croquet* at the Sandringham Croquet Club where his wife is Club Captain and they both play Shield (Pennant). Happily married to Nova for 59 years, they have two children - son Rick and daughter Shelley, plus five grandchildren.

KEN WHITE

A CC To S and CC W

At 15, Ken was indentured to Qantas at Mascot for five years as an aircraft mechanic, continuing with training to became a LAME (Licenced Aircraft Maintenance Engineer). Towards the end of his apprenticeship, he commenced flight training at Kingsford Smith flight school at Bankstown and after 100 flight hours was very fortunate to be awarded one of the first Commonwealth flying scholarships which enabled him to continue on to qualify for a Commercial flight licence, as well as studying – the result of which was more night school.

Offered a job with Ansett Airlines to train as a DC3 Co-pilot, he moved to Melbourne and was a FO (First Officer) for about nine years before becoming a Captain on the Over the next 17 years he flew many different types of airliner which included the goo

Fokker Friendship. Over the next 17 years he flew many different types of airliner which included the good luck to be seconded to Air Vanuatu, Air Polynesia, and Ansett NZ. He was very involved in training and checking company pilots, until 1989 when the infamous industrial dispute arose between the pilots' union and the Hawke government. It didn't end well for either Australia or the industry, but it became obvious to him that he should leave Australia - he says, for Australia's good as well as his.

Singapore Airlines was expanding rapidly at the time but with a whole new fleet of aircraft, they had no idea how they were going to crew them, so were very pleased to be able to recruit a large batch of very experienced pilots from Australia. In Singapore, he flew the Airbus A310 on mainly regional routes and was involved in mentoring and training their junior pilots that were being trained to eventually take over from expat pilots. He was then promoted to 'the wonderful B747-400', flying literally to the four corners of the earth. Aged 60, he reached the mandatory retirement age, so after 45 years in the airline industry, he and his wife, Jenny, returned to Melbourne. Ken has four middle-aged children and seven grandchildren with another one on the way and enjoys gym, U3A, Probus, golf (played badly) bridge, bike rides, whisky, and most importantly, friends and family.


JOHN POUND

John reckons he has so far had a super fortunate life. He spent his early years in Ivanhoe deeply involved with the 1st Ivanhoe Sea Scouts (although a long way from the sea). At the age of 12, he took up sailing seriously at the Royal Brighton Yacht Club and won the Australian Championship in Cadet Dinghies in Perth in 1953, and runner up in Hobart in 1954. He then graduated to high performance off-the beachboats, 14 foot skiffs, and then international 505s and was involved in many sports - pennant squash, scuba diving, bushwalking, tennis, and particularly, snow skiing. Now his main sport is golf at the Victoria Golf Club. Educated at Carey Grammar, he joined the family business of which, at that time, imported Renault vehicles. He worked in all sections of the business, including 18 months as a mechanic, while studying Accountancy at night school, eventually running the accounts side of the business for a number of years. He met his future wife, Louise, while sailing and decided to take a break from business in 1963 and travel to Europe with Louise for six months, sleeping for much of the time in a VW station wagon, and seeing a lot of Europe. He returned to Melbourne in 1964 and resumed work at the car dealership - which now had Volkswagen, Audi, and Subaru as franchises - becoming Managing Director on his father's retirement until the sale of the business. Shortly thereafter, John joined his brother in a business servicing Ford dealers throughout Australia on behalf of the Head Office, distributing point of sale material, and administering incentive programs. During this time John also completed a part-time three year course through Deakin University to gain a Diploma of Financial Planning.

In 1973, John sailed the Sydney Hobart race, experiencing a 70 knot easterly gale on the return trip across Bass Strait which made for a very interesting trip! Louise and John have had a number of overseas trips, including a voyage to Antarctica on a small Russian Icebreaker and a 300 km trek to 5,500 metres in Nepal. They have two sons, Damien and Anton; Damien, a Chartered Accountant who also competes on the International Senior Tennis Circuit and Anton, in a partnership developing housing estates. One of the things not everybody knows about John is that he is an expert woodworker.

GRANT SABIN

Grant lived in Sydney in his earliest years with his mother and her family while his father was a POW. With his father staying in the Army after the war, the family moved around - in Brisbane, Port Moresby, London, Sydney and finally to Melbourne in 1956, just in time for the Olympic Games. McKinnon High School was his seventh school, after which he briefly joined a company of Charted Accountants and then the Bureau of Meteorology as a cadet meteorologist. In 1965, as a qualified meteorologist he was posted to Sydney to provide forecasts for NSW and adjacent ocean waters. An early highlight was the task of establishing an observation station at Badgerys Creek, as an international airport was to be built there.

Returning to Melbourne in 1969, he completed more study and lectured in meteorology in the Bureau's post-graduate training school. Then he was forecasting again while undertaking an MBA and later in the year married Ingrid, after which he was involved in the Bureau's international activities and the World Meteorological Organisation based in Geneva. "By that time in the early 80s", he says," it was the Cold War and all that." However, meteorological data continued to be freely exchanged and still is.

In 1982, Grant became Manager of the Bureau's Antarctic operations at a time when there was talk of towing icebergs to the Middle East. Ironically, In January 1985, he went to work for the Meteorological and Environmental Protection Administration of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia based in Jeddah on the Red Sea. With his family - James, Mikala and Ingrid - he had a great expat life with lots of travel through the Middle East, Africa, Europe and the USA, a fantastic international school for the kids, great times with other expats, dinner parties, tennis, wind surfing, camping and more. He says coming back to Australia, eventually, was a culture shock; however, he continued his involvement with the Bureau's international activities and found himself working with a marketing research company and Ibis Business Information. His last position before retiring was Manager Aviation Weather Services, the highlight being on a panel that developed the Global Volcanic Ash Warning System.
