In conclusion, my sincere best wishes to you all.





# The Last Word

#### When More Means Less

Peter Anderson, CEO, of the Victorian Transport Association delivered a wide-ranging presentation at our February meeting on the state of Victoria's transport and its future. We were amazed to learn that 979 472 trucks operate throughout Australia, heavy vehicles representing less than 10% of all road users. (More than 4.5 tonnes is regarded as a truck: less than that, a commercial vehicle, of which there are six times more than heavy vehicles.) Their key role in society is highlighted during times of temporary crises, such as the recent COVID19 emergencies, when people panic in supermarkets and increase demand for some items such as toilet paper by a factor of five. Without trucks, there would be no food available for households (and no toilet paper!).

In Victoria, current major projects such as rail crossing removals, regional and rural rail and road upgrades, the Metro rail project, the widening of the Tullamarine Freeway, upgrades around the Port of Melbourne and the West Gate Tunnel project are all necessary to increase the efficiency of transport around the state. What many don't appreciate is that bigger trucks equal fewer trips on our roads;

however, there must always be a balance between community amenity and economic efficiency. What needs to be remembered is that when residents demand a reduction of through traffic in their streets, an additional cost is imposed on operators and the supply chain. Curfews, for example, mean trucks have to take a wide circle around Melbourne to get to their destinations.

Similarly, developers of high rise buildings are often oblivious of the needs of transport infrastructure (for example, around Webb Dock) so that people move into their expensive accommodation unaware of the necessity of trucks to come and go night and day. As always, Peter said, such community issues are always a delicate balance between the economy and people's amenity. His one bright note for the future was his confidence that transport would eventually come to rely on hydrogen as a fuel in the years ahead.

#### **Book Review**

The Red Notice - How I became Putin's No 1 enemy by Bill Browder.

This is a true story written about Browder's own experiences as founder and CEO of Hermitage Capital Management, the largest foreign investor in Russia until 2005, when he was denied entry to the country after exposing widespread corruption. Based on a conviction in absentia in the Russian courts on false charges, Browder was the subject of a Red Notice (An Interpol communication that requests the arrest of wanted persons). It is not an elaborate fiction about government corruption, espionage, murder and criminal victimisation in Russia. Every word is true. A great read.
