A highlight was an engineering excellence award for the design and construction of the fully enclosed 131m national broadcasting tower in the hostile environment on Mt Wellington, Hobart. A life-long passion for outdoor pursuits including sailing led him ultimately to ocean racing in Bass Strait and down the west coast of Tasmania. 

### Life, Love and a Higher Being

David Noble, retired Regular Army Brigadier - after 33 years in service, once the youngest Brigadier in the Australian Army - is a Vietnam veteran, engineer and in later years has studied theology. His colourful life included time in Northern Ireland with the British Army and on the Rhine facing the Russians during the Cold War; also attached to the French Army. His extensive training included Duntroon, engineering at Adelaide University and economics.

At age 24, he was appointed a Captain and headed to Vietnam at a time when the Domino Theory was in vogue. It may have been dismissed by some, he said, but people he knew in some Asian countries were not as blasé and feared for the future in the face of communist expansion from the north from Mao and Ho Chi Minh. David acknowledges that the reason Australia went to Vietnam - and also Iraq and Afghanistan - was solely because the US had saved our country, on the point of invasion, from the Japanese during the Second World war. To those who declared that going into Vietnam was stupid, he replies," What war isn't stupid?"



His interest in philosophy, ethics and Christianity took David to undertake a Masters in theology and a study of the life of Jesus driven, he said, by his pursuit of life, love and faith in a higher being.

### The Other Side of Gallipoli

Most Australians have a limited perspective of the infamous Gallipoli campaign. What many don't realise is that this was, in fact, the second part of a failed assault by the British to capture Constantinople a month earlier.

Winston Churchill, the arrogant and despised First Lord of the Admiralty, persisted against the advice of everyone else in the War Cabinet, to conduct the disaster - but used the defeat as an excuse for a combined land and sea attack elsewhere, a nearby Peninsula the Greeks called Gallipoli. March 18 was immediately declared a national holiday in Turkey while the British called on Australian, French and New Zealand troops to help them turn the tide and command the heights of Gallipoli, a first step towards the capture of Constantinople. But it wasn't to be, as Peter McGregor told in his 10minute talk. "The rest is history," he said
