#### **Book Review: Inside the Churchill Family**

Winston Churchill was a very complex, somewhat eccentric, person whose achievements are sometimes overshadowed by his monumental failures – in particular, his single-minded responsibility for the catastrophic Dardanelles campaign during the First World War that cost more than 500 000 lives, many of them from the colonies such as Australia and New Zealand.

Nowhere is his eccentricity more apparent than in his intense relationship with his only son, Randolph. Not to repeat the mistakes that his father, Lord Randolph, made in Winston's careless upbringing, he showered his own son with an obsessive affection that lasted his lifetime through war, politics and family turbulence. On the other hand, Randolph's erratic and irresponsible behaviour never seemed to embarrass Churchill in any way, even during his Prime Ministership. Winston's forceful, overpowering personality and his preeminence as an orator and writer – he was said to have a vocabulary second only to Milton and Shakespeare in English – always carried the day amongst his peers; and Randolph's advocacy for his father never faltered. This is a fascinating tale containing rare insights into a prominent family as well as recent British history and politics.

# **Metro Tunnel Project**

Wednesday July 7

Located in the heart of the CBD across the road from the Town Hall on Swanston Street, the Metro Tunnel Headquarters and Visitors Centre is a great place to find out more about Victoria's biggest ever public transport project and how it will benefit Melbourne. Meet at 10.45 am at the Visitors Centre on the corner of Swanston and



Little Collins Streets for an 11.00 am presentation with morning tea provided. The exhibition includes a large model of the city centre which highlights station locations; also artefacts from the half million recovered from under Swanston Street. At the end of the presentation, we will walk down Swanston Street to visit the Town Hall station site.

We will make our own way to the CBD. The 10 am train from Sandringham is recommended for Bayside members to travel into the City. No charge for this visit but reservations are essential. 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


#### Climate and Science

Koonin is an American scientist who served as Undersecretary for Science in the US Department of Energy. Currently a distinguished professor at New York University, he holds a wide variety of eminent positions including in climate science. One of his specialties is modelling of climate. His new book explores the chasm between what is represented as 'settled science' about climate and what it actually tells us. Koonin accepts that there is some human influence on warming caused by carbon dioxide; however any correlation between CO2 and temperature does not prove causation anywhere near the scale presented in the media.

Climate has been changing constantly in the past, but there is scant evidence that human contributions have been significant, much less disastrous. Koonin cites the annual number of high temperature records that show no significant trend over the past century, nor over the past 40 years. What is of concern is that with increasingly more connected communications we are more aware of floods, fires, droughts, hurricanes and other serious weather events – all of which have occurred over the past millennia. But they do not provide any proof of catastrophic climate change. US tornadoes, for example, have become more benign over the past 75 years. Sadly, media, politicians, and even 'science' reports, often misrepresent what science actually says. Dr Koonin's book testifies that the science of climate change is far from settled.

# The Last Word

### RACV Road to Recovery

Leisure has always been part of the RACV, Geoff Cosgriff, President and Chairman said, from its beginnings in 1903 as a social and car and motorcycle club. "Leisure is in our DNA, " he said. But it now sees its purpose as improving people's lives. Adding value to members, Geoff said.

"The RACV put the experience of our members and customers at the centre of everything we do," said General Manager of RACV Leisure, Geoff Peachev. Via its eight resorts with 1197 accommodation rooms, four golf courses and 23 restaurants - from the Murray, to the Gold Coast, Noosa and Hobart its aim is to provide the best experiences for all members and to make their RACV membership more meaningful, world-class experiences. Also, it seeks to deliver benefits to members through key partnerships with key providers such as Thrifty, APT, Mantra, Marriott and others.

Not surprisingly, COVID had a significant impact on the organisation, down 49% from December 2020. "The business halved in size because of COVID." Craig said, "and many staff moved elsewhere (half its chefs moved into jobs such as construction, for example)". However, half the country's travel agents also disappeared - which the organisation sees as an opportunity for growth. RACV was hit hard but already there are signs of recovery.

Medical Breakthrough

In his May 10-minute talk, retired radiologist Alan Kermond, spoke about a remarkable development that has occurred in the detection and treatment of cancers. For those of us without medical training,



the secret to success seems to rest with the glucose molecule. Treatment - which has a 90% cure rate involves removing oxygen from the cancer cells and replacing it with particles that are radioactive. This is made possible by the use of PET scans which can create an image of the entire body and show if (and where) cancer is spreading to other parts of the body. PET, once rare, are now found in more than 50 hospitals in Australia and can be used to see if tumours are malignant or not. It can even tell the difference between active tumours and scar tissue: or help diagnose or manage central nervous system disorders such as depression and epilepsy.
