



Just when we thought we were out of lockdown!

He will have some surprising observations to share with us at our next meeting.





Train to Nowhere

It has been called the Journey that Changed the World. A group of Russian nobodies living in exile in Switzerland in the early decades of the 20th century travels from Zurich to Petrograd (St Petersburg) in a bare, sealed third-class railway carriage across both warring Germany and the length of treacherous Sweden. They were led by a revolutionary fanatic who called himself Lenin, a zealot anticipating world revolution, starting in countries in Western Europe. What he didn't know was that he was being abetted by the German High Command which saw a unique opportunity to destabilise Russia – Britain's major ally in the First World War – which was beginning to show signs of disintegrating through civil unrest. It worked.

After an arduous and frightening trip of several days, the group arrives on the border with Russia at the Finland Station, Petrograd. They were met by Lenin's excited acolytes - Bolsheviks - armed and ready for revolution. Within months, they had overthrown the czarist regime and begun a frightening reign of terror resulting in the deaths of millions and the start of the Cold War. A gripping, little-known piece of history.

Email scams

Several members of the Digital Technology group have alerted me to the danger of potential email scams. One particularly prevalent at the present purports to come from Telstra but does not have the usual look of an email from Telstra, advising that your bill is available to view. However, if you look at the address from which it comes it is not a Telstra address. My daughter works for Telstra and she has alerted their cyber security group and confirms it is a scam. Advice: DO NOT CLICK on anything.

If you receive an email that looks a bit suspect. check the originating address before doing anything. If it contains a series of numbers and letters, it is probably a scam. Unless it has a recognisable domain name such as "telstra.com".

"bigpond.com" or "gmail.com" delete it. The main aim of scams is to get your email address and then your passwords and that can lead to all sorts of problems including access to various accounts. Geoff Wade





Kipling By Himself

I was unaware that Rudyard Kipling had written this autobiography until discovering a book inherited from my late father, assigned for reading by literature students at Murdoch University where he took a degree. Kipling is of, course, famous for his Jungle Books, Captains Courageous, his poem/hymn Recessional (from which we get 'Lest we forget') and other works that rank as classics of English language. One of the most widely read of all writers, he was Britain's first Nobel Prize winner for Literature, in 1907. His life was one of privilege but also hardship. As a child, he was left in an unfriendly boarding house in England where he was routinely bullied and punished while his parents followed their careers in colonial service in India. As a young man, he worked for colonial newspapers, mixed with many notables including Prime Ministers, military leaders and common people, providing him with unique insights to the great sociopolitical movements of the day. Something of Myself is recommended reading for anyone interested in the history of English colonial life and times. **Duncan Gibson**

Keith Bulfin, self-styled undercover operative, told members in July that after befriending a Mexican who claimed to be a coffee importer (but supposedly part of a major Mexican drug cartel), he was roped in by the US Department of Justice where (he says) he continues to be employed. Following a visit to his home by State and Federal police, together with FBI officials and Mexican Federal police, he was told that his 'friend' was the number one banker for drug cartels in Mexico and Columbia. His first task, he said, was to set up a bank in Santiago, one that could be used to distribute billions of dollars in cash, which he says he did. Credulity a bit stretched here.

Roger's Crystal Ball: Australia's Medal Prospects at the Olympics

With the Olympics about to commence, Roger described five new sports: Karate. Skate Boarding. Surfing, Sport Climbing and BMX Freestyle. Overall. there will be 339 Olympic events at 42 venues which contrasted with Athens in 1896 which had 10 sports and 43 events! For the first time. Australia will have two flag bearers - swimmer Cate Campbell and basketballer Patty Mills.

Roger predicts Australian competitors will gain 49 medals of which 19 will be gold. For the gold, he expects the tally will include women's swimming (5 gold), canoeing (2 gold), equestrian (1 gold), men's hockey (1 gold), athletics (1 gold), BMX Freestyle (1 gold), cycling (1 gold), sailing (2 gold) and women's tennis (1 gold).
