What Members Are Doing



Of Divas and Dukes

Dame Nellie Melba had a magnetism that radiated the sense that she was someone with whom to be reckoned



Helen Mitchell was an Australian operatic soprano who adopted the name 'Melba' from Melbourne, her home town, later moving with her builder father to Mackay, Queensland, where he had a contract to build a sugar mill. A penniless Scottish migrant, David Mitchell found his skills as a stonemason in demand in Marvellous Melbourne where he even had a hand in the construction of the exotic Royal Exhibition Centre and other buildings and became quite wealthy, affluent enough to send his daughter to board at Presbyterian Ladies College, not far from her home in Richmond. *Nellie, The life and loves of Dame Nellie Melba*, traces her turbulent story from humble beginnings to worldwide fame.

Both in Melbourne and Mackay she drew attention to herself through her striking performances at local concerts - initially fund-raising for churches and cricket clubs - which stimulated her ambition to go on the stage. Despite marriage to a rodeoloving country boy - which didn't last - she set off for Europe to further her ambitions. Overlooked in London, once she got to Paris the wide world of classical music and opera opened up to her. She became one of the most famous singers of the late Victorian era and the early 20th century and was the first notable Australian to achieve international recognition. Known from an early age as 'Nellie', she had an attractiveness that 'came as much from her personality with a magnetism that radiated the sense that she was someone with whom to be reckoned'. Wherever she performed, she drew the attention of theatre audiences including kings and princes. One in particular - Philippe d'Orleans, a pretender to the French crown - became the love of her life, but was largely unfulfilled. She was also a regular visitor at Buckingham Palace, the home of Queen Victoria and her son, Edward.

Robert Wainwright's entertaining and informative biography fills in the many gaps in our knowledge of perhaps our most famous citizen.



Leon was born in Melbourne to parents who had served in the armed forces during WW2. His father, Joseph, served in the RAAF and afterwards worked for the *Herald*. Leon's mother, Constance, grew up in the Myponga area of South Australia and was an Army gunner and driver during the War. The family home was in Bayside.


Leon was a career public servant, initially in Human Resources. Leon was Victorian Personnel Manager for 17 years with the Electoral Commission. In that role, he proposed contracting out some operational activities to streamline practice. With the AEC, Leon's interest in relational databases led him to undertake further study in Business Software. A Payroll System Leon designed and developed for the management and payment of Polling Staff was used in Council elections run by the AEC in Victoria.

His interest in software steered his career towards Contracting and Procurement and a change from Human Resources Management; so he joined the Department of Defence where he developed several Procurement Systems deployed across Defence. One of these was to evaluate Tender Bids covering procurements of value ranging from the modest to 10 billion dollars.

Leon met his wife, Michele early in their adult life. Michele - then a designer - introduced him to theatre set building which eventually became a major creative partnership in building sets together during the late seventies and the eighties.

On one occasion, Leon worked with celebrated set designer, John Truscott, though (of course) he says Michele was better! The Last Word

David and Goliath

Peter Sherman, a Director of the Ruthven Institute, described its alliance with the Melbourne University centred on research to improve the profitability and sustainable success of Australian businesses. To put the Australian share market in perspective, he outlined comparisons with the US market. Whereas the ASX has some 2240 listed entities with a market capitalisation close to \$3 trillion in 2021, the US share market has a capitalisation of US\$ 62 trillion.



However, the Australian share market has fewer star performers. Unlike most developed nations, our market is heavily skewed to just two of the nation's 19 industry divisions: mining and finance. These two account for almost 60% of the total capitalisation yet contribute just 19% to the nation's economy (GDP of \$2 trillion). The US has a more contemporary mix loaded with innovation and intellectual property (IP). Further, 14 of our largest 100 listed corporations achieved world's best practice (WBP) profitability of 22%, compared with 40 of the US 100 largest. At the other end of the performance ladder, 27 of our 100 largest listed earned less than the longer-term bond rate or ran at a loss, compared with just six of the US 100 largest listed companies. Lessons from COVID

Well-known professor of epidemiology at Monash University and Alfred Health, Allen Cheng, delivered an enlightening presentation on what we have learned from COVID. Australia is a unique island. with a diverse population and mixed but generally good healthcare. However, he said Australia's main vulnerabilities included frequent travel to China, Federation versus State regulatory contrasts, our remote indigenous communities and fragmentation of diagnostic laboratories.

He described public health governance as diverse and disconnected and often with no background in addressing public health issues. The pathways to opening up again include vaccination nationwide, protein vaccine bases, viral vector developments and RNA/DNA research. Allen said that Australia achieved local elimination of COVID in early 2020. The large second wave in Victoria was controlled and vaccines are now being rolled out with major impacts on outbreak control. In conclusion, Allen reviewed his own role with the media. He expressed disappointment with what he described as the lack of constructive journalism. As a hospital doctor, he was too often suddenly confronted with journalists looking for someone to blame, he said. Simon Appel
