
On Thursday 27 we have the regular Pub Lunch - always well organized by Roger.

The Myth of the 'Stolen Generation'

Distinguished WA Supreme Court judge, Nicholas Hasluck - barrister, poet, novelist and memoirist has produced an illuminating two-year diary of his experiences on the bench which includes his angry challenge to Sir Ronald Wilson's report, Bringing Them Home, source of the 'stolen generations' claims and the allegation of government genocide. In an exchange of letters, Hasluck excoriates Ronald Wilson for implying that Nicholas' father, Paul - Federal Minister for Territories in charge of running Aboriginal policy in the Northern Territory at the time, and later a distinguished Governor General of Australia - was behind the child-stealing racket. If true, Sir Paul Hasluck was a genocidal monster. Nicholas would have none of it. He has chastised Wilson, calling his lack of due process as reprehensible and described the characterisation of Sir Paul as offensive. He took particular offence at the numbers of literati who have since used (and continue to use) Wilson's report to tarnish the names of patrol officers, teachers, missionaries, nurses, and administrators who worked in good faith with limited resources in the best interests of all indigenous communities, defaming them with comparisons to the iniquitous gas chambers of Nazi Germany. Significantly, Hasluck's maiden speech in the federal parliament calling for the rights of Aborigines to be respected, was described by Gough Whitlam as 'the most thorough speech ever to have been delivered in the parliament'. It is a travesty that false charges of genocide and a 'stolen generation' still infect much public debate and discussion of indigenous affairs more than 20 years later. Peter McGregor

FROM TANKS TO TRACTORS

After 23 years in the army, reaching the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, November Keynote Speaker, Garry Spencer OAM, has devoted time to a number of community projects. Garry described his recent innovative role introducing retired ADF personnel to grain harvesting across Australia. "If you can drive a tank, you can probably drive a tractor!" he said. With the usual backpackers not available, tank operators quickly assumed the role as accomplished grain harvesters. Commencing in Queensland and extending to Western Australia. Australia's harvest from east to west is the biggest on record, some 55 million tonnes.

With travel compensation for operators provided by the Federal Government, a Facebook page was established which attracted over 2,000 'hits' from active and retired army, aviation, firemen and police personnel. A web page is now established at www.opgha.org.au.

Together with Grain Producers Australia, and the Rural Employment for Veterans (REV), Garry has formalised the involvement of experienced veterans who greatly enjoy the opportunity to contribute, in the company of like-minded and experienced mates in a new reunion template.
