

A life member of the Brighton Icebergers, it took 19 hours and 45 minutes, and he swam 68km - double the direct route of 34 km due to tides. 
Brighton Theatre Thursday 23 November at 8.00pm

Richard Royle: Health in a Digital World

in the near future, we will live in smarter, safer homes that monitor all aspects of our daily lives, according to September's Keynote Speaker, Richard Royle. Richard, who was responsible for the design, construction and running of Australia's most digitally-connected hospital at Hervey Bay, described some of the current amazing developments in digital technology that promise fully integrated care. "They will transform the way we live in future and how the health system responds to our needs," he said. "The future of digital health lies in consumers gaining accurate personal information that is easily available." The iphone may have begun the process, but it has been progressed by the new smart watches we will all wear that monitor our vital statistics and connect to health and community services that can collect disease-specific health information and transmit data to remote servers for follow-up by healthcare providers. Additionally, these systems build a picture of a person's daily routine and detect deviations that may indicate illness or injury, connect with video-conferencing systems and facilitate social connections with family and friends. Future health care will include predictive analytics, the use of our DNA profile that will provide proactive treatment and the increasing use of robots that can be operated remotely by specialists, ensuring that patients in regional or remote regions can expect those services. It promises a new era of personalised medicine. However, the key to the implementation of these systems in our homes, hospitals and community services rests in being able to resolve the challenges of inter-operability; that is, the many digital systems that carry essential health information about us being able to talk to each other. What stands in the way, Richard said, was the usual vested interests and Australia's federal system of competing states. Peter McGregor

Allan Stone: More than Just Tennis

Few are more qualified to talk about Australian tennis and the Australian Open than our September 10-minute speaker, Allan Stone. A player for 15 years, he has played in or commentated on the Open for 60 years which, before its rebirth was rotated in various locations around Australia; but always struggled to compete with the rest of the world. It was too far for the world's best players to travel to, it was played on grass with poor prize money and had few sponsors. Its first 'permanent' home was Kooyong but in 1988 moved to a new facility, Rod Laver Arena at Melbourne Park, with the support of Premier John Cain. (Allan lost in the semi-finals to Ken Rosewall and, as a second-stringer, received a paltry \$1000 for his troubles). By the time of the first Open in Melbourne's purpose-built, state-of-the-art stadium - when John Newcombe played Jimmy Connors in the final - it had started to attract some of the top players: Matts Willander, Steffie Graf and Chris Evert began making their appearance, followed by Agassi, Becker and McEnroe. Today, it is a major world-class sporting event and, more than a mere tennis tournament, it is a centre of entertainment for thousands, inside and outside the arena. It is worth \$300 million to the Victorian economy, offers \$75 million in prize money (plus points) and attracts 900 000 through the gates over two weeks. Melbourne is no longer a 'sleepy hollow' in January.
